**Formed in 1972, FMAS is the standard bearer for financial markets professionals in Singapore. Their history has been inextricably linked to Singapore's emergence as a leading financial centre in the world.**

Formerly known as ACI Singapore – The Financial Markets Association, the Association was renamed to Financial Markets Association of Singapore on 31st March 2021, and is affiliated with ACI – The Financial Markets Association, the global body. This Paris-based global body, Association Cambiste Internationale (ACI), has more than 13,000 international members worldwide in over 60 countries, making it the largest international association in the wholesale financial markets. ACI was founded in France in 1955 following an agreement between foreign exchange dealers in Paris and London.

FMAS is an active participant in the ACI Global arena and with the ACI FMA Standing Committees. FMAS's Singapore members have been elected to various global committees over the years, and presently to the ACI FMA, Board of Education.

FMAS is also a leading Financial Markets Training provider in Singapore, with its industry-standard, in-house training based on a training roadmap developed in partnership with the Singapore Management University (SMU). All these underpin FMAS's commitment to the continuing education and professional development of our members, and the industry.

Over the past 30 years, FMAS has raised over \$14.3 million through its annual Charity Golf and Dinner events. This charity drive is widely and actively supported by our members, the dealing fraternity and financial institutions across Singapore.

In 2023, the FMAS Charity Golf Fundraiser raised \$370,695 from 45 family offices, corporate and individual donors. The funds have been committed to support 13 social impact projects in 2023.

# Executive Summary

**The FMAS Trampoline Fund is a partnership fund administered by The Majority Trust that supports nonprofit programmes and initiatives that address the longer-term needs of vulnerable groups in Singapore, to provide a “trampoline” for them to bounce back from difficulties towards a better future.**

Since 2020, the FMAS Trampoline Fund has raised \$2.91 million, supporting 67 projects. Last year, **FMAS raised \$370,695 at the 2023 FMAS Charity Golf Fundraiser which supported 13 social impact projects and served 16,745 beneficiaries** in the domains of education, employment and community projects.

This report provides an update on all projects since 2021 with a focus on the 2023 grantee partners.

The Fund supports programmes in 3 domains:



## Education

Working with children and youth to build key academic and interpersonal skills;



## Employment

Helping those from disadvantaged backgrounds find better jobs and build careers;



## Community

Improving our collective well-being, and communal ability to support families who are striving to do better.



The FMAS Trampoline Fund draws inspiration (as well as its name) from President Tharman Shanmugaratnam's "trampoline" idea — that social assistance should ultimately help those in need bounce back and thrive.

The Fund looks at supporting programmes that work with the vulnerable and disadvantaged to further empower them to change their lives for the better.

# Collective Outcomes

Since 2021

The FMAS Trampoline Fund covers a range of beneficiaries and clients, spanning children, youth, women, working adults, and the elderly. It provides multiple opportunities for people to bounce back, no matter where they are in life. Given the diversity of target groups, different metrics are used to measure the Outcomes from the three pillars.



## Employment – Enhanced employment prospects

Overall, funded programmes have helped to enhance the employment prospects of programme participants at the job searching phase, and in actual employment.

### Job preparation

Participants who have undergone Image Ready's IM Ready! Programme reported an average improvement of 60% in their confidence to self-promote after attending the programme.

### Actual employment

Daughters of Tomorrow's Job Readiness Programme has helped 77% of participants from the Job Readiness Programme sustain employment for more than 6 months.

The Prison Youth Outreach Programme by REACH Community Services has also helped 65% of their youths gain employment and/or go back to school.



## Education – Better academic performance, social and emotional learning competencies, and parental self-efficacy

Overall, funded programmes have directly and indirectly contributed to better educational outcomes of programme participants through direct academic support, the strengthening of social and emotional competencies, and the empowerment of parents in their child's education.

### Direct academic support

Participants of HCSA Community Services' Getting Back on My Feet! programme had all successfully graduated to their next respective academic level of study.

**Social and emotional learning** Teachers from ART:DIS' Ceramic Art Programme have reported improvements to participants' social skills such as the development of appropriate eye contact, and the ability to initiate and comfortably share about their day.

Participants from Tasek Jurong's Art Lab Programme reported that 7 in 10 participants felt competent, and experienced autonomy during their art lab sessions.

### Parental programmes

Parents who went through Curious Thoughts Giving's Watering the Seed programme reported feeling, on average, 75% more confident in teaching their children English.



## Community – Improved general wellbeing

Overall, funded programmes have contributed to improvements in the overall wellbeing of their beneficiaries, such as lower levels of distress.

### Mental Wellbeing

81% of surveyed youths reported reduced anxiety levels after using the service provided by Limitless.

Participants of SPACES Counseling and Community's Oogachaga YOUth programme also shared qualitatively that SPACES had provided them with a welcoming and open space which allowed them to feel safe enough to share their worries and concerns openly with lesser qualms.

# 2023 Grant Outcomes

As funded programmes from the Education pillar only commenced in 2024, the runway is too short for grantee partners to collect meaningful outcome data. Against this context, we will only report outcomes from the Employment and Community pillars in this section.

## Employment

The Trampoline fund seeks to help those from disadvantaged backgrounds (e.g. ex-offenders and vulnerable youth) find better jobs and build their careers. Types of programmes funded under this category include mentoring, and job preparation programmes.

The HSCA Step Up programme provides social support and mentorship to 20 ex-offenders and at-risk girls. The programme is currently ongoing and mentorship areas broadly cover career, personal, and academic growth. Based on their mid-mentorship report, 89% of surveyed mentors and mentees reported being satisfied with the programme. Mentees have also shared qualitatively that they feel comfortable seeking advice, and have received guidance to actively work on, and achieve their goals.

## Community

The Trampoline Fund also funds community programmes with the aim of improving general well-being, which includes mental well-being and social well-being. Our grantee partners have reported improvements in the overall well-being of their beneficiaries. Specifically, 81% of surveyed youths reported reduced anxiety levels after using services by the Limitless team.

TMT will continue working closely with grantee partners to collect more outcomes data to help us better understand the longer-term impact of the Fund.

# Featured 2024 Grantee Partner Stories

## New Life Stories

Every child is embedded within various systems of support – however, when one pillar falls, the child is crippled from opportunities. New Life Stories works with young children whose parents are incarcerated, through reading as a medium, while working with incarcerated parents to return to their role as parents upon release – in order to rebuild the child’s systems of support.



## HCSA Community Services

Ex-offenders and youth with complex traumas are often well-supported within the existing ecosystems in their recovery and reintegration. But after systemic support, their social disadvantage, lack of access to education and upskilling opportunities holds them back, affecting their reintegration into society. HCSA plugs that gap through a mentoring programme in partnership with corporates.

## ISAAC Singapore

Not everyone is born with the ability to communicate the same way as the rest of us do. For people who use alternative and augmentative forms of communication (PWUAAC), AAC is their main mode of communication. However, this mode of communication is rarely seen. ISAAC Singapore works to raise awareness of AAC, by having awareness-building events co-organised by PWUAAC and their families.

## 13 Limitless Ltd: Mental Health Counselling and Case Management ONGOING

This project provides vulnerable youths with a low entry barrier to early intervention mental health support without having to worry about cost and access, with the aim to reduce levels of psychological distress and to improve the biological, psychological, social and spiritual functioning of participants while in the programme. Based on the data collected, 81% of surveyed youths who utilised the service reported reduced anxiety levels after using the service.

This helps families build resources to buffer against crises, reduce their anxiety of being in debt and increase their emotional capacity and cognitive bandwidth to manage challenges and plan for the future, with the longer term outcome of both instilling a habit of saving money and avoiding debt.
