Formerly known as ACI Singapore – The Financial Markets Association, the Association was renamed to Financial Markets Association of Singapore on 31<sup>st</sup> March 2021, and is affiliated with ACI – The Financial Markets Association, the global body. This Paris-based global body, Association Cambiste Internationale (ACI), has more than 13,000 international members worldwide in over 60 countries, making it the largest international association in the wholesale financial markets. ACI was founded in France in 1955 following an agreement between foreign exchange dealers in Paris and London.

FMAS is an active participant in the ACI Global arena and with the ACI FMA Standing Committees. FMAS's Singapore members have been elected to various global committees over the years, and presently to the ACI FMA, Board of Education. FMAS is also a leading Financial Markets Training provider in Singapore, with its industry-

standard, in-house training based on a training roadmap developed in partnership with the Singapore Management University (SMU). All these underpin FMAS's commitment to the continuing education and professional development of our members, and the industry.

Over the past 29 years, FMAS has raised over \$14 million for the less fortunate in our society through its annual Charity Golf and Dinner events. This charity drive is widely and actively supported by our members, the dealing fraternity and financial institutions across Singapore.

In 2020, the FMAS Trampoline Fund raised \$758,000\* at ACI Live Aid – Financial Markets Give Back 2020, from 131 family offices, corporate and individual donors. In 2020, the Fund awarded 15 grants.

In 2021, the FMAS Trampoline Fund raised \$818,000\* at the FMAS Charity Golf 2021, from 35 family offices, corporate and individual donors. In 2021, 21 grants were awarded.

In 2022, the FMAS Fundraiser and Gala raised a record \$966,000\* from 54 family offices, corporate and individual donors. In 2022, 20 grants were awarded.

# Executive Summary

**The FMAS Trampoline Fund is a partnership with Financial Markets Association of Singapore (FMAS) to support nonprofit programmes and initiatives that address the longer-term needs of vulnerable groups in Singapore, to provide a “trampoline” for them to bounce back from difficulties towards a better future.**

Since 2020, the FMAS Trampoline Fund has raised \$2.54 million, supporting 56 projects. Last year, **FMAS raised a record \$966,000 at the 2022 FMAS Fundraiser and Gala which supported 20 projects and is projected to serve 15,307 beneficiaries** in the domains of education, employment and community projects.

This report provides an update on all projects since 2020 with a focus on the 2022 grantee partners.





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# Outcome Metrics<sup>1</sup>



## Employment

The Trampoline fund seeks to help those from disadvantaged backgrounds (e.g. ex-offenders and vulnerable youth) find better jobs and build their careers.

Types of programmes funded under this category include job preparation programmes and job confidence building programmes.

Broadly speaking, **grantee partners reported improvements to self-esteem, increased job confidence, and better beneficiary employment outcomes.**

Graduates of HCSA's programme have obtained a WSQ Higher Certificate and were guaranteed job placements in the food industry. Based on their data, participants have reported a starting pay of at least \$1,700 (as of 2022).

Participants who have undergone Image Ready's IM Ready! Programme reported an average improvement of 60% in their confidence to self-promote after attending the programme.



## Education

The Trampoline fund also funds education programmes that build key academic and interpersonal skills in children and youth. **Grantee partners have reported improvements to not only academic performance, but also academic confidence.**

For instance, HCSA has reported that participants of their programme have all

successfully graduated to their next respective academic level of study.

ART:DIS has also reported improvements to participants' social and communication skills. Some examples include participants' ability to communicate their comprehension, as well as the ability to initiate and share with programme facilitators about their day.



## Community

The Trampoline Fund also funds a diverse range of community programmes with the aim of improving general wellbeing. Specifically, projects look at mental wellbeing, financial wellbeing, and social wellbeing.

**Our grantee partners have reported improvements in the overall wellbeing of their beneficiaries, which include a sense of achievement and satisfaction, improved social skills, greater self-esteem, and lesser distress.**

# Featured Stories: Canossaville

## Trampoline Fund 2022 – Canossian Family Care Services (CFCs)



### **Giving every child an equal opportunity to thrive**

Do you know of a child in Singapore who has never been to the zoo or Sentosa? Or whose parents think that play is an unnecessary waste of time? These are some of the children and parents that Canossaville Children and Community Services (Canossaville) work with.

The Canossaville's Child Development Unit (CCDU) is a team of allied health professionals who support and promote the holistic development of the children in the Canossian Village and their families. Being able to offer these services in-house ensures that the children and families who require these services have easy and timely access to them.

### **Focused on the family**

Michelle Soliano, Head of CCDU, explains that it is not enough to just work with children but to understand and work with their families too.



“We initially worked only with the children. And then we realised that we needed to get into the systems because all this information helps us identify the issues that the child is facing. What we try to do is to help our children remove some of those obstacles and challenges,”

“And often what we find in our vulnerable families are parents who are incarcerated, families with a history of poverty, parents who are in an abusive marital relationship, single parents who are struggling, or transnational families where the spouses are unable to adapt to the local norms and cultural expectations. And not all of them have access to tuition, counsellors or therapists as this would be a lot of money.”

## Looking through trauma-informed lens

A number of our children served by the Family Care Unit at Canossaville have experienced trauma. Michelle elaborates, “It’s not just about the things that happened to them but it’s also about the things that don’t happen for them that’s supposed to happen during their developmental age, like having the security of housing, a caregiver who is always there meeting their needs and food on the table regularly.”

**“Even the access to play is supposed to be something children have. But many of the children we see grow up really fast because they don’t have the opportunity to play. They become the mini-parent, the caregiver or are so busy caring for themselves. They go home, they do the laundry, they fix their lunch, they do their homework and wait around until their parents come back.”**

## Timely intervention for single mum and son

When a single mother, Jen\* and her son, Alvin\* moved back to Singapore, her boy displayed a lot of behavioural issues from the start of Primary One. Alvin had gone through a whole host of changes in his life at a young age – his parents got divorced, he was moved to a new country, and he had to witness his mum struggle with unemployment while searching for a permanent home for both of them.

Both Jen and Alvin used to clash often and Jen struggled to manage their tumultuous mother-child relationship. Thankfully their relationship improved after joining the Little Dino programme where both mother and son attended multiple sessions separately at the start, and later attended sessions together.



The Little Dino programme which Alvin attended with other children, helped him learn about structure, managing his emotions, expressing himself effectively, and making his needs known.

For Jen, the group sessions with other parents helped her pick up helpful parenting tips as the therapist listened to the parents' challenges, and had parents roleplay different scenarios to help them better understand how to react well to the challenging situations.

Jen was also able to share her story with other parents and this opportunity made her realise how far she had come. What she shared was also an encouragement to other parents who were in the same programme.

Towards the end of the programme, both Jen and Alvin built a mini-terrarium together during the combined parent and child sessions.

The terrarium, made up of different items such as gravel, soil, different small plants and other decorative pieces, is meant to symbolise the many things that go into how a family can function in a more healthy way.

Once the mini-terrarium is ready, both mother and son learnt that it still needs to be watered and looked after regularly, just like how a family needs to be constantly

nurtured. The mini-terrarium also acts as a reminder to the family to practice the tools that they have learnt and constantly work at improving their family ties.

## A better road ahead

Although Alvin is still affected by the absence of his father, this mother and child relationship is still seen as a win for the Little Dino programme as Alvin has now blossomed into a confident young man whose mannerisms and behaviour no longer cause issues in school. He also has healthy interactions with his peers and teachers. Both mother and child will soon be discharged from therapy.

With grants from the FMAS Trampoline fund, Canossaville ran the Little Dinos Programme and Playing with Purpose, reaching out to 27 children and 23 parents. They will be conducting two more programmes in the second half of the year through the Beyond Parenting Programme and Project Casa Mia.

Through the programmes, parents will be better equipped with effective parenting practices, increased self-confidence in parenting and increased sense of connectedness to support resources and support networks available for them. With funding taken care of, Michelle adds that her staff have also been able to focus all their energy on developing and improving programmes to better help more families.

## Trampoline Fund 2022 – DOT Job Readiness Programme

### From making ends meet to a life transformed

There was a point in Suhailahwati's life when she thought she would never be able to find employment. With three young children to care for, no roof over their heads and little formal education, the spunky 43-year-old was at her wit's end.

Suhailahwati approached a social worker for help and was introduced to Daughters of Tomorrow (DOT). That was in 2015.

### Uncovering a hidden entrepreneur

When Suhailahwati was first introduced to DOT, she was offered a home-based job so she could work while looking after her three young children. She was provided baby products to sell online

and she soon realised that she had a knack for it. The experience helped her realise she was rather entrepreneurial.

Following the success of her first foray into the home-based business, DOT put Suhailahwati in touch with a social enterprise to sew bags from home. She again excelled in it.


DOT saw her potential and approached her to join them as a Co-ordinator for the Job Readiness Programme in 2017. Suhailahwati was so good at her job that she was promoted to a Senior Executive 3 years later, and continues to work with DOT today.

DOT not only helped Suhailahwati on the job front but encouraged her to upskill by taking on a part-time Diploma in Community Engagement and Development at ITE Central, paid for by DOT. She will be completing her Diploma course in 2023.

"DOT has helped and impacted me a lot. I feel grateful to DOT for giving me a chance to continue to study and improve my life. The people at DOT are so supportive! The Job Readiness Programme helped me a lot with building my confidence. I hope that I can help more ladies by giving back."




## Connecting the dots

Suhailahwati feels she has what it takes to promote the Job Readiness Programme to other women, "Having been through the course helps me do my job better. The ladies I reach out to are more willing to come for the DOT Confidence Curriculum programme after hearing that I have gone through it myself."

Since it was incorporated in 2014, DOT has impacted more than 1400 women in the community through its skills-training, job bridging and support programmes.

Kim Underhill, Management Consultant and volunteer trainer who conducts the 'Attracting and Creating Success' module at DOT shares her experience with the women she trains, "All the women need is a little direction and guidance to see the light at the end of the tunnel. When they feel that attention is given to them and that somebody is offering them some help, they are motivated to do better. When you give them the time of day, you can see the difference, and see them making the difference."

## Trampoline Fund 2022 – Jetpack

### Jetpacking off to academic success

“I really like studying. I want to be highly educated but my circumstances put me at a disadvantage. So I always felt really sad about it,” said Maleha.

From the age of 14, Maleha lived in different hostels for girls due to challenges in her family. Hostel life was no walk in the park. Maleha struggled with the rigid routine and strict discipline at the hostels and missed out on school, more than she had wanted to.

In the midst of her struggle, and with no money of her own, Maleha decided to drop out of school before she could complete her O-Level examinations.

After working for a year, Maleha’s desire to study propelled her to sign up as a private candidate for the O-Level examinations. Despite having to juggle work and studies, Maleha passed all her O-Level subjects bar one.

Hoping to improve her situation, Maleha borrowed money from her mother, which she has yet to repay, for a course to become an Allied Educator.

It was while working full-time as a classroom assistant that a volunteer at one of the hostels where Maleha used to reside reached out to her. The volunteer asked if she wanted to further her studies, and Maleha was referred to Impart.

“I want to go to university. But my family is very traditional. The women in my family are not highly educated and they don’t see the need for women to be educated. I want to be the first woman in my family to get higher education.

“I knew I had to work very hard. I didn’t know if I could do it. But I had to do it because it was my only way out,” said Maleha.

Maleha’s determination, drive and wit convinced Impart that she would be a perfect candidate to benefit from the Jetpack programme even without stellar O-Level grades.

## Unconventional help for extraordinary outcomes

Jetpack, supported by FMAS, is a holistic programme developed by Impart to provide academic support, career exploration, and financial literacy and practice for youths-facing-adversity. The programme is targeted at youths aged 15 to 19 years.

Despite Impart's faith in her, Maleha struggled to believe in herself, wondering if she could succeed. But with education bursaries secured, Maleha was able to stop work to focus on studying for her A-Level examinations as a private candidate. But the road ahead was tough.

Impart gathered a group of five volunteers to support her through her studies and prepare her for her A-Level examinations. She was tutored by each volunteer once a week for about two hours each time.

As her tutors were University students, her lessons would usually take place at open spaces on the University campus that her tutors were from. And the commute to and from her lessons would take about half a day.


### "Someone believes in me"

"No matter how tough it was, I forced myself to study. I put in so much hard work because I had everything to lose. I was being funded, so I felt I really can't screw this up because somebody else believes in me." said Maleha.

That belief spurred Maleha to press on. She completed her A-Levels in half the time it would normally take. Sitting for the examinations after one year instead of two.

"In the first half of the year, I studied six to seven hours a day. In the second half of the year, it increased to eight to nine hours a day. Right before the A levels, it was at least ten hours a day, sometimes 14 hours a day," said Maleha.

With no preliminary examinations and no real examination experience to lean on, Impart created a safety plan with Maleha to manage her emotions in the event that her results did not turn out well. But Maleha's hard work paid off. She attained grades of ABBCC for her A-Level examinations in 2022.



## Giving back

Now, at the age of 21, Maleha has applied to two local universities and is awaiting the results of her posting.

“I hope to study Psychology at University, maybe be a teacher and work with kids with special needs.” And Maleha knows she would not have been able to achieve her dream of being the first female in her family to enter University without the help of the volunteers and the role Impart played.

“I think the Jetpack programme is not conventional. Academically, I could not have gotten into any junior college with my O level results, so the path I took to attain my A-Levels was not the conventional pathway. The Jetpack programme was tailored for me and that’s what helped me do well. I think Jetpack is a great programme. I have signed up to volunteer and give back.” said Maleha.

## Timely intervention to impact lives

Maleha is not the only youth that has turned her life around thanks to the Jetpack programme. “In 2022, Impart supported slightly over 100 youths and we are projecting a similar number in 2023,” said Joshua Tay, Impart’s Deputy Executive Director.

Joshua explains that Impart intervenes to help youths get much-needed support earlier or quicker than they would normally do. At present, higher-risk and higher-need youths are more likely to get access to help only when they are institutionalised or when they are flagged up by the system.



“It didn't make sense to us that you have to be bad enough to get good help, so we're here to change that through a range of services. We do that across our educational services, our mental health care services, and certain community-based programmes.”


